16. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary	
<p>The University offers multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary courses as part of curriculum like MBA, MBA(HR), MBA(Tourism), Mass communication, Women's studies, Environmental science, Geospatial Science, Nutrition and Public Health, Molecular Biology & Human Genetics which are increasingly gaining popularity amongst students. These courses enable students to gain comprehensive understanding of complex societal and scientific issues. A student can not only analyze a particular topic from different viewpoints but also as part of Interdisciplinary/Generic elective, a student studying a particular subject is required to pursue a course from another subject in a completely different domain. Students can thus see the interconnections between seemingly unrelated concepts. In addition, these programmes/courses often involve a more practical approach to learning, which enhance the ability of the students to tackle real world issues that may not fit effectively within the boundaries of a single discipline. The University believes that multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary programmes/courses by initiating collaboration between students and faculty from different academic backgrounds are effective for preparing students to develop a broader skill set, critical thinking and reflect the interconnectedness of contemporary challenges. The students can thus gain a better insight and knowledge of their chosen subject and gear up for a successful career.</p>	
17. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	
<p>The university has taken cognizance of the fact that Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) allow the students to accumulate credits for courses taken through the SWAYAM and other platforms. The University earnestly endeavors to provide students with the opportunity to gain recognition for their learning efforts, and to make it easier for them to transfer credits. The University has been trying to develop a framework wherein students can easily transfer credits not only from one course to another but also from one institution to another. Currently students can earn credit by pursuing a course through</p>	

SWAYAM platform. This, the University believes, would enable students to pursue their career goals, as they can obtain recognition for the relevant courses they can pursue and transfer credits. Hence the University is in the process of carving out an appropriate system in alignment with the guidelines of the government and other statutory bodies.

18.Skill development:

The University has skill development aspect embedded in its several post graduate subjects. This apart an attempt is being made to impart specific skill-based education in a holistic and comprehensive manner through its "Benoy Krishna Choudhury Rural Technology Centre" (BKCRTC) and the newly formed "Centre of Innovation, Entrepreneurship and Skill Development" (CIESD). Skill development is crucial for staying competitive in a rapidly changing world and investing in skill can lead to increased confidence and contribute to personal and professional growth and success. We believe that professionally qualified students having sound knowledge and expertise on a concerned domain of skill may have more job opportunities in service, industry or self-employment sectors. Demand and scope for such professionally equipped students are predominantly visible in the applied fields of almost all basic/core disciplines. This is likely to proliferate in future with the rapidly evolving global scenario of the post COVID-19 pandemic era.

The University advocates the integration of Indian knowledge systems in all the facets of teaching-learning and the respective departments have incorporated this aspect while framing their curriculum. The academic and administrative departments teach, practice and celebrate the depth and diversity of Indian cultural heritage. It takes effort to instill awareness amongst learners regarding the value of traditional knowledge systems and find ways to incorporate them into every sphere of life leading to better living standards. The University understands the significance of traditional knowledge and intends to inculcate a system that would enable students to know how it can be recognized and incorporated in the educational systems, business practices, and other walks of life. Additionally, the university understands that societies can preserve respect and benefit from the wealth of knowledge embedded in traditional knowledge systems thereby promoting a harmonious integration with contemporary achievements and problems. By fostering an integration of our rich traditional knowledge system with contemporary practices a balanced and sustainable future can

thus be created.

20.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The University recognizes the significance and relevance of Outcome based education (OBE), which is an educational approach that emphasizes defining specific learning outcomes and aligning instructional practices to achieve these. The University staunchly believes that students should be evaluated on the basis of their learning experiences, of the knowledge and skills that they have acquired instead of focusing only on the content that they have been taught in the postgraduate classrooms. Accordingly, in alignment with OBE, the University emphasizes on setting specific, measurable, achievable, relevant, time bound (SMART) learning objectives and assessing students' progress towards achieving these thereby ensuring that students are well equipped to face real world challenges. The faculty members are encouraged to employ varied teaching methods and ensure flexibility in the mode of instruction. Overall, the University, while considering the imperatives of OBE, is planning to build up an academic ambience that would enthuse the students to acquire appropriate and requisite knowledge and skills so as to adequately prepare them to achieve excellence in all future academic, research, professional endeavors.

21.Distance education/online education:

The Centre for Distance and Online Education (CDOE), BU formerly Directorate of Distance Education, BU was established in 1994. The first of its kind in West Bengal it evolved and developed since its inception and presently it has a sound infrastructure of its own and conducts several postgraduate programmes on the basis of the approval of UGC-DEB and AICTE. Situated near the Golapbag Campus of the university, the CDOE can boast of a beautiful building of its own with the latest infrastructure. It houses all the administrative departments of the Directorate and organizes counseling sessions for different programmes under Distance mode. It has adequate faculty and staff for imparting quality education through distance mode.

While developing the programme curriculum, suggestions from different stakeholders like faculty members of the concerned Board of Studies, subject experts from other universities, experts from corporates, alumni are obtained so as to enable the students to gain the foundational knowledge of the respective subjects encompassing social science, literature and culture, economical and managerial, political and philosophical, historical aspects, life science, chemical science, physical science by adopting CBCS and student centric teaching-learning methodology in the unique nature of Outcome Based Education (OBE). As a result, all the programmes of the University possess well-defined programme outcomes, programme specific outcomes, course outcomes and course specific outcomes. Industrial or Research internship helps students to experience solving problems and acquiring skills in scientific and empirical results and aptitude to apply the monitoring parameters/methodologies to examine the social and scientific problems, models etc. using suitable data and analytics. The operational execution of IPR centre is motivating the faculty and researchers in transforming their research results into intellectual property rights (IPR), creating the avenue for start-ups.

The University of Burdwan, with the all-out support of the IQAC, keeps on strengthening the curricula by incorporating components of new trends and accentuating application-oriented studies. The curricula focus on meeting the contemporary national and global standards both technically and crosscutting issues by integrating all the relevant facets of societal obligation, professional ethics, gender and human equalities and values, environmental sustainability through various courses. In order to safeguard gender sensitization,

the University offers a PG degree in Women's Studies. The Swami Vivekananda Advance Research Centre of the University has been working continuously to educate and spread human values. The departments of the university have concern towards sustainable environmental reforms and they contribute to such reforms. 2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

As University of Burdwan is one of the oldest and preferred universities in the state, generally relatively worthy students take admission into various UG and PG courses. Based on the relative position obtained in the entrance examination and the marks/grade secured in the qualifying examination and through the performance in the class, the advanced learners and slow learners are identified. The department concerned identifies the slow learners who require remedial/tutorial classes. Remedial coaching classes are conducted for the slow learners. Sometimes, tests/seminar presentations are conducted for tracing their understanding level. When the slow learners get equipped with reality, they are brought back to the mainstream of learning. Counseling through the mentor-mentee system is also active. The faculty mentors concerned interact with the advanced learners to identify their competencies and special interests. For advanced students, we give some references in general /common classes. Often expert professionals are invited to interact with the advanced learners in their respective fields and thus, we encourage them in generating interest in learning and research. As a large number of students come from backward areas, we arrange for counseling in academic and professional matters in order to motivate them in pursuing higher education and research.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem-solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

The University of Burdwan uses student-centric methods for enhancing learning experiences of the students and to achieve programme objectives. Students' feedback mechanism supports various academic activities of the university, which creates a conducive environment to enable the students to develop entrepreneurial and research skills. Special lectures /remedial classes /microteaching/ conferences/quizzes/seminars/workshops/role playing/term papers are organized to instigate and motivate students to experience participative learning. Social interactions through community engagement and extension activities like field works, case studies, survey work, assignments, NSS and exhibitions have been made as curricular components for students as per NEP 2020 guidelines to develop leadership skills, socially responsible person, good citizen, volunteerism and employment experience. Most of the departments have students' committees for organizing curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities. The interdisciplinary courses help to associate theoretical and practical knowledge. The CBCS generates platforms to grow knowledge on interdisciplinary areas. Prevalent use of case study methods is stimulated to enhance the problem-solving capability of the students. Use of ICT & e-resources by students is encouraged. Project works in all practical subjects ensure teamwork and participative learning. Dissertations for problem-based learning, MOOCs, self-developed-videos, PPTs/presentations, Google maps, E-Journals/books/e-learning resources in order to enrich their experiential learning.

2.3.2 - Teachers use ICT enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning processes during the year

With the objective of encouraging students to form a long-term learning process, teachers of the university are usually coalescing technology with traditional means of instruction. The academic departments have well-equipped laboratories, well-furnished/ICT

enabled rooms, smart class rooms, state-of-the-art seminar halls/conference rooms and LCD projectors etc. Internet facilities are provided to all students, administrative offices, and libraries. Upgradation in network and communication throughout the university campus has led to reliable and fast wireless and LAN connectivity. ICT resources in the Digital library provide an open-access LMS to both teachers and students. Faculties update themselves with the latest developments using ICT tools and strive for individual and institutional excellence. Based on the subject-specific context, faculties employ ICT-based teaching. Some of the faculty members are involved with e-PG Pathshala Programme, MOOCs course under SWAYAM. Faculties can take classes, upload documents, conduct online exams with live proctoring, upload assignments. Freely available MOOCs courses and freeware lecture modules are provided. During the pandemic period several faculty members developed individual classrooms in digital platforms. Students participate in the collaborative learning activities with the guidance from the teachers using ICT tools on assignments/term papers/projects/research problems etc. Faculty members have conducted national level AICTE-sponsored ATAL workshops online.

2.5.3 - IT integration and reforms in the examination procedures and processes (continuous internal assessment and end-semester assessment) have brought in considerable improvement in examination management system of the institution

The University of Burdwan has a well-established and efficient continuous evaluation system with diverse types of assessments. The institutional reforms are in line with that suggested by the regulatory authorities like UGC, AICTE, leading to improvement, efficiency and transparency. The University has emphasized on the automation of the Examination Management System (EMS) with the pre-examination, examination and post-examination processes. The controller of examination notifies online to the concerned colleges/departments with examination dates. Students have to register online for examination by paying requisite fees through a payment gateway. The hall tickets are generated automatically by the computerized system, if approved by the respective heads of the departments online. The faculty members enter the semester examination marks, project work evaluation, practical examination marks and viva voce examination marks online. The results are notified and hosted on the university website. Students are given an opportunity to apply for review of evaluation. There is a seamless link from entry to exit of a student through the student life cycle mechanism. The continuous internal assessment is in the form of class tests/ assignments/ term papers / seminars/ case discussion. Students can also opt to earn credits through online offerings such as SWAYAM.

2.6.1 - The institution has stated learning outcomes (generic and programme specific)/graduate attributes which are integrated into the assessment process and widely publicized through the website and other documents	
<p>The University of Burdwan emphasizes on student centric learning with the exclusive nature of Outcome Based Education (OBE) approach, which is derived from Competency-Based Curriculum. As per guidelines regarding Graduate Attributes (GAs) prescribed by UGC, AICTE, etc., they also include sustainable development as its focus. Departments of various subjects declare the Course and Programme Outcomes (COs/POs) for their courses. The revised syllabi are referred to by Boards of Studies and then to the Faculty Council, consisting of expert members representing various segments of the society. The course and programme outcomes are devised with a view that students will be having more practical-orientation than theoretical-orientation so that they will prove to be competent for not only local but also at national and global level. The POs, PSOs, COs, and learning outcomes are widely published through various mediums and they are further disseminated during the induction training program in the beginning of academic year. Generally, every PG Department organizes well-defined induction programs for freshers in an interesting manner and delivers the POs & COs in the introductory lecture for getting the essence of the course and to suggest the changes in knowledge/skill level. Effectiveness of teaching-learning is safeguarded through conducting OBE workshops.</p>

There are specific guidelines for evaluating the attainment levels	

of COs & POs. The guidelines have been introduced for all programmes and hence the graduate attributes are accomplished. Teachers make the corrective actions for the improvement identified in these POs through direct and indirect methods of assessment. All the departments follow the identical assessment pattern, i.e. 80% to End Semester Examination and 20% to Internal Assessment. The performance in the internal examination (assignments, mid exams, surprise tests, quizzes, projects, presentations etc.) and their performance in the term-end examination are noted by using a direct method of assessment. Indirect surveys are carried out about the POs and PSOs attainment. In Indirect Assessment, the survey forms are used to collect responses from the stakeholders concerning POs and PSOs. Departments have provisions for imparting computer training/field-based survey/internship/ dissertation/skill development programs. These motivate the students to learn their lessons and recognize the requirements of the job market/pursuit of higher studies. The indirect measurement is carried out on the basis of the structured feedback obtained from the students. Considering the learning outcomes, apart from class room teaching, the departments arrange remedial coaching, group discussion, seminar, conferences etc., to instill enthusiasm for learning among the learners.

The university takes effort to upgrade the research facilities in the light of the emerging needs of the academic departments and the well defined research policy is in place for promotion of research with focus on infrastructure upgradation, internet access, digital access to libraries for the spread of research facilities. Projects in collaboration with industries are encouraged. With national and international organizations, a number of MoUs were signed. The University had built a planetarium with assistance from Japan. The interdisciplinary research is acknowledged by the PURSE programme grant. University researchers have been encouraged to form partnerships with foreign universities and R&D organizations. 6.2.2 - The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment and service rules, procedures, etc.

As per the administrative structure, the 'Court' is the highest policy-making body of the University. The Executive Council is the highest executive body and initiates relevant proposals to recommend to the Court. The Vice-Chancellor is the executive head while the Registrar, as the Administrative Officer, is the custodian of all documents. The Pro-Vice-Chancellor, Finance Officer, Inspector of Colleges, Controller of Examinations, Joint Registrar, Secretaries of Faculty Councils (FCs) etc. look after issues encompassing compliance, finance, research, administration, examinations, etc. The Deans look after the academic matters through participative approach. The FCs for Postgraduate Studies address academic and research issues.

The departmental activities are channelised through Departmental Committees (DCs), Board of Studies and Board of Research Studies. Academic matters are pursued through a bottom-up approach and

proposals are initiated from the DCs and forwarded to the university authorities. There are delineated rules and regulations for recruitment and promotion. Faculty recruitment and promotional policies are governed by the UGC and GoWB rules, regulation, orders and that of non-teaching staff are based on the GoWB rules and regulations. Grievance and complaints are basically addressed by the appropriate bodies like Grievance Cell, Anti-Ragging Committee, Internal Complaint Committee etc.

6.3 - Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 - The institution has a performance appraisal system, promotional avenues and effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff

The university gives adequate emphasis on ensuring promotional avenues for teaching and non-teaching staff while strictly complying with the extant rules and guidelines. Promotion of teachers is based on objective appraisal on the basis of API score (as per norms of UGC and Govt. of West Bengal) and recommendation of Screening Committee and/or Selection Committee. For officers, career advancement is based on a self-appraisal report, confidential report from the controlling officer and recommendation of the Standing Committee constituted as per statutory provision.

There is provision for Group Mediclaim policy for the existing teaching and non-teaching staff and ex-staff members as well. There is a stand alone and fully functional health center for the

stakeholders of the university with basic health infrastructure. It provides medical facilities at subsidized rates, medical reimbursement and special health check-up camps. The uniforms are provided to the group-D employees and there is also provision for house building loans, house repairing loans etc. for the employees at a relatively lower rate of interest. Employees are also provided with the opportunity to take loans through BUECCSL.

Financial assistance is provided for organizing sports and cultural activities. In-campus accommodation facilities are provided to the teaching and non-teaching staff.

The University created a corpus fund of substantial amounts. The interest income accrued from this earmarked fund will be utilized for supporting student & employee welfare, imparting training and research in various branches of learning and courses of study and for promoting advancement and dissemination of knowledge for extending higher education which is the growing need of the society. All the stakeholders are benefited through university welfare schemes, health schemes, to meet financial exigencies of employees.

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the university has been steering and coordinating the activities of the departments in understanding the quality issues relating to teaching-learning. Biomedical waste management: Management of Biomedical and Chemical waste and monitoring of research work involving Biohazard issues is performed under the strict surveillance of the Institutional Biosafety Committee (IBSC, BU) chaired by Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor, The University of Burdwan. The IBSC has been entrusted to monitor the following: Decontamination and Disposal, DISPOSAL METHODS, Disposal of Hazardous Chemicals

Solid waste management: The university of Burdwan has a biodegradable solid waste management system. The facility is located in the Crop Research and Seed Multiplication Farm of the University. Sewage treatment plant at golden jubilee building: The treatment process provided in this plant is completely based on Extended Aeration Activated Sludge Process with diffused aeration system followed by Tube Settler along with Tertiary Filtration Unit. After treatment, water can be discharged into the nearby sewer line or can be reused for gardening/ toilet flushing etc.

Liquid waste management: The Department of Chemistry has installed a hazardous liquid chemical waste management facility.

7.2 - Best Practices

7.2.1 - Describe one best practice successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual

1. **Natural Resource Management & Biodiversity Conservation.**The Golapbag Campus, known as BIODIVERSITY HERITAGE SITE has a varied campus structures like green Golapbag, Krishnasayar Eco garden containing huge plant diversity maintained since 1960. The rich reservoir of flora consists of Bryophytes-20 species, Pteridophytes-20 species, Gymnosperms-20 species, Angiosperms over 400 species, Mahogany (Swietenia mahogany) over 150 years old. Water bodies inside the Golapbag campus and in the Krishnasayar used for pisciculture and for watershed management practices. The Department of Environmental Science has undertaken the carbon footprint analysis of Golapbag campus.

2. **Crop Research and Seed Multiplication Farm (CRSMF):** A Pride of our University CRSMF since 2002, in collaboration with Department of Agriculture, Govt. of West Bengal, Programme on 'Foundation & Certified' seed production for Paddy, Mustard, Gram, Lentil and Moong. The seeds produced by CRSMF are sold with the trade name "Kishan Bandhu". Over 1200 farmers annually are benefited in getting our seeds. On an average CRSMF annually produces more than 49 tons of seeds. We have established a germplasm conservation of "Mango", four nos. of potato cultivars. Research facilities are provided to the students of Botany, Zoology and Environmental Science departments as and when asked for.

7.3 - Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 - Highlight the performance of the institution in an area distinct to its priority and thrust (within a maximum of 200 words)

Binoy Krishna Choudhury Rural Technology Centre (BKRTC) of the University played a crucial role for upliftment of the unemployed and underprivileged sections of the society through some skill development programmes. The CRSMF conducted the programs to disseminate the technological know-how in the field of agriculture; scientific and technological know-how for overall socio-economic benefit of the rural community, and introduction of number of short term training programmes and outreach activities like,

- Freshwater Pearl Culture - BKCRTC in collaboration with Takipara Fish Culture Society (FCS) at Balagarh, Hooghly organized this program for the students and the students performed the Community Engagement Service among the FCS units of the area.
- Entrepreneurship in Agriculture & Aquaculture - BKCRTC and CIESD jointly organized this program for the trainees represented by rural unemployed/self-employed persons/farmers involved in agriculture/aquaculture activities in and around the districts of Purba Bardhaman, Paschim Bardhaman and Hooghly.
- Workshop on Intellectual Property Rights & Protection - This workshop was organized with the objective of to make everyone familiar with Intellectual property, IP rights and to impart greater awareness about the related technical issues associated with protection of IPR and also its benefits to socio-economy in May, 2023.
- Business Plan Hackathon - With the objective of instilling entrepreneurial motivation among students and research scholars a Business Plan Hackathon was organized by the CIESD in April, 2023
